





The following words have invariably been used to describe the character and nature of Bishop Peter William Ingham: compassionate, warm, approachable, humorous, humble, kind-hearted, dedicated, ecumenical, sincere, positive, gentle, inclusive, prayerful, filled with grace.

As a priest and bishop, Peter was truly, in the words of Pope Francis, a "shepherd who lives with the smell of the sheep"—a dedicated, prayerful pastor. He always wanted to be a priest, and this desire was fulfilled at the young age of 23 when he was ordained to the priesthood for the Archdiocese of Sydney by His Eminence Cardinal Norman Gilroy

at St Mary's Cathedral. Following some parish appointments, he spent six years as private secretary to His Eminence Cardinal James Freeman and general secretary of the archdiocese for 10 years. In 1990, he returned to parish ministry before being ordained auxiliary bishop of Sydney in 1993 by His Eminence Cardinal Edward Clancy. He was installed as the fourth bishop of Wollongong in 2001 at the age of 60. He retired in 2017. In June 2022, he was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in 2022 for "significant service to the Catholic Church in Australia".

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Modelling his life on that of Jesus, the Good Shepherd, Bishop Peter was a true disciple and servant of the people of God—rejoicing in the achievements of those around him; ever-alert to picking up and carrying gently on his shoulders those who stumbled. This demanded genuine self-sacrifice as he often put the needs of others ahead of his own.

The diocese has experienced several significant events that serve as a backdrop to highlight various characteristic aspects of Bishop Peter's life.

The Vocations Conference in 2006 showed clearly how deeply he valued the priesthood, married life, religious life and the single vocation. It reflected his inclusive approach to people. This pastoral inclusiveness extended to those beyond the Catholic Church, as witnessed by his friendship with the other churches and his presence at civic functions. His easy-going, humorous nature, coupled with an always "glad hand" gave expression to the Gospel imperative: "Go out to all the world and tell the Good News" (Mk 16:15).

The diocese was a major sponsor of World Youth Day Sydney in 2008. The visiting young people from across Australia and beyond witnessed and experienced the ease and joy with which he engaged with them, and they spoke to us of their envy that he was *our* bishop.

The canonisation of Mary MacKillop in 2010 and his insistence on a diocesan Mass was as much an opportunity for us to honour Australia's first saint as it was to celebrate the Sisters of St Joseph, and indeed all religious women and men for their contribution to the development and continuing life of the diocese. The religious men and women of our diocese are in no doubt as to the value he placed on the witness of their lives, their prayer, and their ministry.

The celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of the diocese in 2012 spoke of his joy and gratitude for the people of the diocese, men and women of faith, who continue to build on the sure foundations laid by those who have gone before—not that the people of the diocese needed a special anniversary to realise that Bishop Peter was truly happy to be among them, and deeply valued their presence and contributions to the Church's life.

The celebration of Masses and sacraments in parishes each year and the time he gladly took for photographs with each child and their families, and his mingling with all who attended, added to the joy of the occasions. He had that wonderful quality of being able to "work a room", and make everyone feel special. He described those times as: "Loitering with intent," saying, "The loitering is the hanging around after Masses and school functions, Confirmations ... and



the intent is the witness to the Gospel; getting to know people, and mixing with them, so that when they did have something they wanted to talk to you about, they didn't have an inhibition about approaching you."

Following the announcement of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse in 2013, Bishop Peter wrote to the people of the diocese: "I welcome the Royal Commission. The protection of children is of prime importance, not the protection of any organisation. Victims and their families must receive respect, justice and compassion." Those who worked closely with Bishop Peter knew that the Commission was given his total commitment and cooperation. The people of the diocese appreciated that he wrote to them when the diocese was asked to provide

documentation relevant to the inquiry; when the diocese was called before the Commission, and also at the conclusion of the public hearing. Bishop Peter's openness in communicating the trust he placed in his people was highly valued.

In 2003 and again in 2014, the diocese hosted major liturgical conferences that highlighted the high importance he placed on the Blessed Eucharist as the "source and summit of the Christian life" (*Lumen Gentium*, 11).

It is evident that no one person can have all the knowledge and skills to be able to address each task well. True leadership encourages others to bring their knowledge and skills forward and integrate them into a harmonious whole. Those who were privileged to collaborate closely with Bishop Peter were heartened by the confidence



he placed in them and the strong support he afforded them, personally and professionally, which empowered them to take the love and compassion of the Lord to those to whom they ministered. His trust in, and love for, his clergy was something that Bishop Peter treasured. In 2013, he addressed them at the Chrism Mass with the words: "We all need encouragement, we all need hope, we all need fresh heart, me included. I know you, too, need fresh heart. I know it's not easy being a priest in today's climate. I want to thank you for everything you do in your ministry in this diocese. You have a special place in my heart and in my prayers, and indeed you give me fresh heart."

In a recent interview, Bishop Peter said, "I usually think of myself as

a very ordinary horse in this human race. I didn't see that I did anything spectacular, but I've basically just tried to be there for people."

To us, Bishop Peter, there was nothing ordinary about you! You were a spiritual father of the Illawarra, Macarthur, Shoalhaven and Southern Highlands. We join our Magnificat with that of Mary as she sings her praise for God's unfailing faithfulness to you, and for your faithful, generous response. We offer you, Bishop Peter, a heartfelt "well done, good and faithful servant" (Mt 25:23), and we take comfort in the sure hope that we now have another advocate in the presence of our Lord praying for the needs and salvation of the people of God in the Diocese of Wollongong.

Coat of Arms and Motto

A bishop's Coat of Arms and Motto (known as "ecclesiastical heraldry") refers to the use of heraldry within the Church for dioceses and clergy. Initially used to mark documents, ecclesiastical heraldry evolved as a system for identifying people and dioceses. In the Catholic Church, most bishops, including the pope, have a personal coat of arms and motto.

Ecclesiastical heraldry differs notably from other heraldry in the use of special insignia around the shield to indicate rank in the Church. The most prominent of these insignia is the low crowned, wide brimmed ecclesiastical hat, commonly the Roman galero. The colour and ornamentation of this hat indicate rank. Cardinals are famous for the "red hat", but bishops are usually the green hat. In the Catholic Church, unless a new bishop has a family coat of arms, he typically adopts within his shield symbols that indicate his interests or past service. The display of a cross behind the shield is restricted to bishops as a mark of their dignity. Their motto is a short phrase usually appearing below the shield as a statement of belief.

In Bishop Peter Ingham's Coat of Arms, the **crossed keys** are a symbol



of St Peter, which was Bishop Peter's baptismal name and patron. The **owl** is from the Ingham family crest.

The cryptic Motto of four words *Per Ipsum—lpsa Duce* (literally meaning: "Through him, herself leading") was composed in 1957 for the late Sir James Darcy Cardinal Freeman KBE by the scholarly Dr William Leonard of St Patrick's College, Manly, at the time Monsignor Freeman was nominated bishop. Cardinal Freeman was a close friend and valued mentor to Bishop Peter.

Per lpsum expresses in shorthand the doxology of the Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass: "Through him, and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honour is yours, for ever and ever. Amen."

lpsa Duce refers to the Blessed Virgin Mary "leading" or "giving us the example" of how to worship the Father—through, with, and in Jesus, in union with the Holy Spirit (cf. *LG* 8).



On the first day of the week, two of the disciples were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him. He said to them, 'What matters are you discussing as you walk along?' They stopped short, their faces downcast.

Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.' 'What things?' he asked. 'All about Jesus

of Nazareth,' they answered, 'who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they did not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'

Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the Scriptures that were about himself.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening,' they said, 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the Scriptures to us?'

They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'Yes, it is true. The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.
